**ILLOGICAL LOGIC.**  
Monday's Waukegan Daily Gazette devoted a column and a half of its 22-inch columns to the so-called "gambling hell" out west on Carlan's farm. It does not defend the place, but it says the Citizens' League to be consistent should go for the county fair managers for allowing betting, etc., on its races fair week. We have no desire to restrain the committee respecting gambling at the fair, or gambling anywhere else. But the Gazette's logic is lame, very lame in fact. It assumes that betting on the fair races and this new institution are parallel, and then hurls logic at the committee. The committee will take care of itself. But that logic.

If the Gazette's parallelism was correct, its logic would be sound. But the cases are no more parallel than the sides of a triangle. The fair betting lasts for only a couple of days, and is only an incident of the fair. Hundreds of people, yes thousands of people go to the fair who never think of betting. They go to see the show, the "hoss trot" included, but no betting. That is all. The betting, gambling if you will, is but an incident, and we dislike and disapprove of it in toto.

But over on Carlan's farm betting is the thing. There is nothing else, we are told, except an open and well patronized bar. And gambling is not only the business of the place, but its purpose is permanent, seven days and nights in the week and fifty-two weeks in the year, as we are informed. The Gazette learns that everything is quiet and orderly there. But how long will that be so? Let it run all winter as it is said to run now, quiet. No Lake county people allowed near it, or within its inclosure. When spring and summer comes, what would happen? Everybody knows the varied forms of vice which naturally and inevitably gather about such a place. Perhaps not on that identical acre, but there are other acres near by.

Besides the moral odor of such a place would contaminate the whole of Lake county from Barrington to Benton, Zion included. It would put in peril almost every home in our county and be a perpetual temptation to our young, the students in our schools and colleges, and give Lake county a black eye, throughout the country. Nothing of the kind can be said of the betting over on the fair grounds for a couple of days.
