THE ELECTION.

There was an election Tuesday for a judge of some thing, and it was in some respect one of the most exciting held in his city for a long time. The six judges, clerks, etc., were on hand at 7 a. m., opened the polls and looked out of the window to see the long file of several scores of anxious voters waiting to vote, but they failed to materialize. They waited an hour, and no man came, when James McDonald, the faithful supervisor, went out and hunted up one man and scared him into going over and voting. That was number one. Another hour passed when Clerk Waldo remembered a man to deliver him a carcass of a rat on at that time, and he went over to his market and told the man he might not get his pay for that sheep till he voted. The candidate number two. Then Baron Hipwell told half a dozen stories about the "auld country," and another man dropped in, accidentally, and they made him vote. Just before 9:30 Alderman Brand happened to think of several business men who would be on their way for that train and he went out and intercepted them, and that swelled the list to ten. There was a lull for half an hour. At 10 o'clock Mr. Waldo moved that "something has got to be did," and it was carried unanimously. A committee of two, Finney Winchester and H. M. Prior, was appointed to go out into the highways, stores, markets, banks, etc., and drum up voters. By 11 o'clock they had secured four more and then they went back to the library building, where the election was being held, and rested. At 11:30 Mr. McDonald went out again and happened to find Judge Hibbard in the street, whom he collared and led to the polls, and that made fifteen votes, which fact filled the judges, clerks, et cetera, with great joy. While the judge was there Baron Hipwell fell into his habit of storytelling, and finally tried to sell his honor one of the chairs for a judicial bench. At 11:45 Clerk Prior looked at Elgin's watch and said, in his usual laconic manner, "It is time to eat." A recess of an hour and thirty minutes was taken, a hasty deglutition is injurious to health. At 1:30, or a little later, business

was resumed at the old stand, and by dint of frequent assaults on a patient public, six more voters were secured in the afternoon.

At 5 o'clock, the hour fixed by the statutes of the state of Illinois for such cases made and provided, the polls closed. And then a problem of overwhelming magnitude confronted those judges, clerks, etc., namely the counting of those votes accurately. Finally it was decided that, as Messrs. McDonald and Waldo were in practical business all the time, they should do it. Laying off their hats and coats they went at it, after asking Banker Hipwell to keep tab on the enumeration to detect and correct any errors he might discover in the herculean task. Every little while the enumerators stopped to wipe the beads of perspiration from their manly brows, and finally after many hours' hard, patient and careful work they reported the result as follows: Total number of votes cast, 21—there are about 600 votes, all told, in the town of Deerfield—for Lawyer Arthur E. Frost, 21; scattering, none. Therefore A. E. Frost is the choice of the voters of Deerfield.
