MRS. CUNNINGHAM.

Mrs. Eliza P. Cunningham, who died in her home on Second street Monday February 24, at 5:15 a. m., was born in Madison, N. Y. April 28, 1823. Her maiden name was Richardson. She married Deacon James T. Cunningham, of Willoughby, Ohio, in 1852, whither her parents moved when she was about 8 years old. In 1865 they moved to Union, Rock County, Wisconsin, where her husband, who had been a faithful deacon since he was

ary, 1874. They had four children, two sons and two daughters. One of the boys died in April, after his father, and Miss Alta, January 6, 1892, leaving one son, L. E. Cunningham, of Chicago, and Mrs. Rozilla Alvord, of this city.

Mrs. Cunningham united with the Baptist church in her girlhood home in Ohio when a young woman, and lived a devoted christian life till the end. She was a quiet, reserved woman, but highly esteemed by all who knew her, and loved by her large circle of friends. The marked feature of her christian life was its fidelity.

The family moved from Berlin to Beaver Dam, Wis., in the '70s and here in 1882.

Her funeral was held at her late home, Wednesday morning at 10:30, conducted by Rev. J. M. Coon, the family pastor, during their residence

at Beaver Dam, and the interment in Waukegan.

In the death of Mrs. Cunningham the church loses a faithful, devoted member, and the community a most worthy and exemplary christian woman.
