CITY COUNCIL.

Everything went as still and smooth as possible—just a little zephyr over Knox & Schumacher's attorney bills. Knox wants \$75 for defending Mayor Cobb in that old Gail small-pox suit. He may get it; he did not Tuesday night. Schumacher's bill was \$124.70 for lots of work in defending Dr. Hawkins, O. G. Phillips, et al., members of the old board of

health. Mr. Phillips made one of his speeches in favor of the city paying the bill. It was plausible but not "powerful convincin'," unless one was real open to conviction. Mr. Veteran Watchdog of the Treasury Moses Moses called attention to the fact that it takes the majority of all the aldermen elected to carry such a measure, and then the aldermen saw that they had overlooked that point, that the bill was "in the soup," and so the whole matter was sent to Mr. Smoot.

The electric road offered to pay their share, one-half or more, of paving St. Johns up to the electric light plant, where their tracks leave the street, if the city will not compel them to pave between the rails along that distance. After some discussion the meas-

ure passed, and that makes practically sure that St. Johns from Central up to Vine will be done this season. We do not want paving between the rails, except in front of the depot grounds; only have the roadway kept clean and trim.

The contract for the new fire department building was let—the carpenter work to Alfred St. Peter and the mason work to Henry Ditmer—for \$1,532, just \$32 more than the original estimate. They will both do good work and the city will have a suitable building.
