Attorney Ernest S. Gail, candidate for alderman in the Second ward, has almost the united support of the voters of that ward. While there are no bitter feelings against his opponent the residents of the Second ward do not feel safe in electing a representative who is liable to be called away from the city any day, as was the case when Dr. Turner was elected several years ago. The government, in whose employ Dr. Turner is as a veterinary surgeon, is sending large consignments of stock to the Philippines. Possibly the doctor may be ordered there tomorrow.

THE ALDERMANIC SITUATION.

It would seem (especially in the Fourth ward) that the habit of flooding the public with beer and other intoxicants on election occasions is coming more and more forcibly to the attention of the public, and we understand the battle in that ward is taking rather sharp lines. In the Third ward it is also a question whether one who is a habitual drinker and an advocate of license in Highland Park shall be elected to represent the ward or whether somebody else opposed to the whole business shall be one of the council.

In the second ward we know nothing personally concerning Dr. Turner. The fact that at one time he was elected alderman and never took his seat, but left the ward without full representation for a whole year may have been his misfortune rather than his fault; nevertheless, unfortunate for the public. Mr. Gail is a young lawyer, known to be sound, intelligent, straightforward, ambitious and progressive.

We are not aware that the temperance question is raised in the First ward. Whoever is elected, the public is thoroughly anxious that the energetic, progressive and peaceful methods of the present administration of advancing the interests of the public shall not be disturbed.
