HIGHWOOD.

The election was the most hotly contested that place has ever witnessed. W. F. Hogan has been president of the village for years, practically since its organization some eighteen years ago, and no man can be in power that length of time without developing strong opposition. In Mr. Hogan's case that culminated Tuesday and the figures stood as follows for village president:

Michael Gibbs.....	126
W. F. Hogan.....	119

Mr. Gibbs received a majority of 7 votes. The village trustees are all Hogan men, and of course can, if they see fit, annoy and hamper Mr. Gibbs very much. It is hoped they will do nothing of the kind, but work for the best interests of the village.
