There is now a definite movement being made for the enlargement of Fort Sheridan military post, notice of which has heretofore been made by this paper, and the preliminary steps indicate the movement of greater magnitude than was at first expected by those not conversant with the government's plans.

is procuring a considerable extent of adjoining territory, Johnson S. Prall, the well known real estate man of Highland Park, acting as agent for the government in the deal under the direct orders of General McArthur. Mr. Prall is commissioned to procure all of the strip of land lying between the reservation and the Northwestern railway from the Fort Sheridan depot to the Chicago & Milwaukee electric railroad power house. In addition to this he is to procure all the land lying south of the reservation to a line drawn from Fort Sheridan Park to Lake Michigan. In this work Mr. Prall is authorized to ascertain the price wanted for each piece of land in the tract, and in each instance good prices are paid. Where parties refuse to sell condemnation proceedings are to be instituted to fix the valuation.

When the desired land is procured the present troop accommodations of the post are to be doubled.—Waukegan Gazette.
