CITY COUNCIL.

There was a regular meeting of the city council June 3, all members being present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and on motion of Ald. Turner, seconded by Ald. Moses, were approved.

Communication of H. P. Davidson, concerning amending of ordinance on firearms. Ald. Everett moved, seconded by Ald. Shields,

request of petition. Motion lost.

Petition of property owners for the extension of time for one year for building sidewalk on north side of Prospect avenue from Dale avenue to the bluff. Ald. Woodruff moved, seconded by Ald. Shields, that the ordinance be repealed. Motion carried.

Petition of property owners on the west side of Dale avenue for a repeal of the ordinance for sidewalk from Central to Prospect avenue, or extension of time for one year. Ald. Warren moved, seconded by Ald. Brand, that the time be extended for one year on the ordinance for sidewalk on the west side of Dale avenue from Central to Prospect avenue. Carried.

Petition from property owners in Block 52, requesting the city council to vacate the alley in said block. Ald. Everett moved, seconded by Ald. Shields, that the request of petition-

moved, seconded by Ald. Turner, to amend by adding "upon the property owners filing an indemnifying bond with the city to protect the city from any damage suits. Amendment accepted and motion carried.

Communication from S. M. Millard, concerning gas lights on Lake avenue and Sycamore place, referred to committee on streets and alleys.

Communication from H. A. Ritter, concerning fast driving of automobiles, referred to committee on streets and alleys.

Communication from mayor, on First street water mains, referred to committee on fire and water.

Communication from A. Laing, on Lake avenue washout and its causes, referred to committee on streets and alleys.

Board of local improvements recommended ordinance for draining of Vine avenue and First street. Motion carried to expend \$175, C. & N.W. Ry. to pay \$270 towards the improvement.

Committee on printing reported on bids on city printing and recommended that the contract be awarded to the Highwood Independent. A motion was made by Ald. Morton,

seconded by Ald. Warren, that the report be accepted and contract awarded. Motion lost. Ayes—Warren, Turner and Morton. Nays—Moses, Everett, Woodruff, Shields, and Brand. Ald. Warren moved, seconded by Turner, that the matter of the city printing be referred back to the committee on printing for further consideration. Motion carried.

Motion by Ald. Warren, seconded by Ald. Everett for suspension of

rules, for allowing payment of bills.

On motion by Ald. Woodruff, seconded by Ald. Everett, the question of lowering the water main on St. Johns avenue was referred to the committee on fire and water with power to act.

P. W. Rectenwald came in for considerable adverse criticism in regard to several cement sidewalks put down by him, which the property owners refused to pay for the work on account of alleged poor workmanship, and in which the city will have to defend the contractor, owing to the fact that the foreman of streets accepted the work without careful examination.

NORTH SHORE CHAPTER.

The annual meeting of the North Shore Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, was held May 12th. The following officers were re-elected: Regent, Miss Henrietta

Flint; vice-regent, Mrs. Chas. Warren; treasurer, Mrs. W. O. Hipwell; secretary, Miss Eva Egan; registrar, Mrs. L. M. Millard.

Reports read showed that the membership list was gradually enlarged every year.

A committee was appointed to arrange for the purchase of an historical picture to be presented to one of our public schools.

It will be remembered that the chapter has already donated several pictures and medals to our schools, but the citizens more especially recall the efforts of the society in raising the funds necessary for the purchase of the village flagstaff and flag, which were formally presented to the town by appropriate exercises on Nov. 3, 1896. This is recorded on a metal plate at the base of the staff.

The next meeting of the chapter will be held at Egandale on Flag day, June 14th, to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the adoption of our flag by the American congress.

An interesting feature of this meeting will be an exhibition of revolutionary relics in silver, china, clothing, military accoutrements and documents.
