**AN ORDINANCE.**

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING TAXES for corporate purposes for the fiscal year from May 1st, 1902, to April 30th, 1903.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That whereas the total amount of all appropriations legally made for all corporate purposes and to be collected from the tax levy of the fiscal year of said city, ending April 30th, 1903, having been ascertained by said City Council to be the sum of Nineteen Thousand One Hundred and Fifty-Five (\$19,155) Dollars and the purpose for which said appropriations are made and the sum or amount appropriated for each purpose being as follows:

<b>STREETS AND BRIDGES</b>	
For constructing, repairing and maintaining streets and bridges.....	\$ 3,000 00
<b>SEWERS</b>	
For constructing, repairing and maintaining sewers....	600 00
<b>STREET LIGHTING</b>	
For street lighting for year.	3,410 00
<b>PRINTING AND STATIONERY</b>	
For printing and stationery purposes.....	200 00
<b>LIBRARY</b>	
For public library purposes.	1,000 00
<b>SALARY OF OFFICERS</b>	
For salary of city officers....	4,400 00
<b>BOND AND INTEREST</b>	
For bonded indebtedness and interest falling due...	5,445 00
<b>MISCELLANEOUS</b>	
For miscellaneous corporate purposes not hereinabove enumerated.....	600 00
<b>FIRE DEPARTMENT</b>	
For meeting contingencies...	500 00

Total appropriated.....\$19,155 00

Now therefore said City Council does hereby levy said Nineteen Thousand One Hundred Fifty-Five Dollars upon all property subject to taxation within said city as the same is assessed and equalized for State and County purposes for the current year, as the city taxes for the City of Highland Park for said year ending April 30th, 1903.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk is hereby directed to file a copy of this ordinance, duly certified, with the County Clerk of Lake County, State of Illinois, before September 1st, 1902.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
