**BOIL THE LAKE WATER.**

The following has been received by City Clerk Finney from the Columbus Laboratories, Chicago:

CHICAGO, Aug. 27, 1902.

John Finney, City Clerk, Highland Park, Ill.—Dear Sir:—We send you herewith report of analysis of water received August 22. A comparison of this report with the result obtained on samples collected July 29 will show that there is considerable improvement over the samples of that date. The total number of bacteria is markedly decreased and the number of colon bacilli is less. The water is, however, still suspicious on account of the presence of the sewage bacteria.
