JOHN SOLOMON TAYLOR.

John Solomon Taylor, a well-known resident of Glencoe and the son of Anson H. Taylor, the Chicago pioneer, for whom Taylor street was named, died in St. Luke's hospital Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock after undergoing an operation for appendicitis. The funeral will be held Sunday at the Sacred Heart church, near Glencoe. The interment will be in the Schermerville Catholic cemetery. According to present plans Mayor Dennis and the members of the town council, in which Taylor had held a seat for the past five years, will act as pallbearers.

Mr. Taylor was born in the LePere house, then known as the Half-Way house, where the stage coach running between Chicago and Waukegan stopped to change horses. He expected to enter the priesthood, but after graduating from Notre Dame university changed his plans. He bought a large farm outside of Glencoe, which he conducted up to the time of his last illness, mingling at the same time in public affairs. At one time he was chief of the Lakeside volunteer fire department. Mr. Taylor leaves six children—Florence, Frank, Arthur, Clarence, Harold and Maria. He is survived by three sisters—Monica and Maria Taylor and Mrs. Eliza Gormley—and two brothers—Henry T. Taylor, of Glencoe, and Louis R. Taylor, of Colorado.
