

SCHOOL NOTES.

HIGH SCHOOL.

It was learned with equal regret on the part of the board, faculty, students and parents that Miss Easton, of Cattaragus, N. Y., who last year taught the Latin classes and was in charge of the girls' gymnasium work, has been under the doctor's care all summer, and owing to severe nervous trouble, will not be able to resume her work in the high school this year. The school has been fortunate in securing Miss Martha Matheny, of Normal, Ill., a graduate of the University of Chicago, with master's degree, to succeed Miss Easton in the department of Latin, Greek and Ancient History. Miss Matheny, before coming to Highland Park, was for several years principal of the high school at Crown Point, Ind.

Miss Ethel Pardee, who comes highly recommended from the Marshfield, Wis., high school, will occupy the position filled last year by Miss Smith, and will have charge of the girls' physical training department.

Miss Fannie Bliss, of Oak Park, who for nine years has been the teacher of German and French in the Oak Park township high school, takes the place vacated by Miss Chase as instructor in those languages.

Miss Nell Williams, of Clarksville, Ohio, a graduate of the University of Chicago, with a bachelor's degree, will fill the new position occasioned by the incoming class which was so large that it was necessary to divide it into two sections. She will have the two sections in the first and second years in English and two sections in the first year algebra.

Miss Bradshaw, of the Dewey school, Chicago, comes out every Tuesday to instruct the two lower classes in drawing.

The school is more than fortunate in securing Miss Wycoff as instructor in voice culture. She will teach the singing classes on Tuesday and Friday of each week.

Mr. Wilson has the mathematics, Miss Stewart the department of science, and Mr. Scrugham has the shop work and the boys' athletics.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL.
