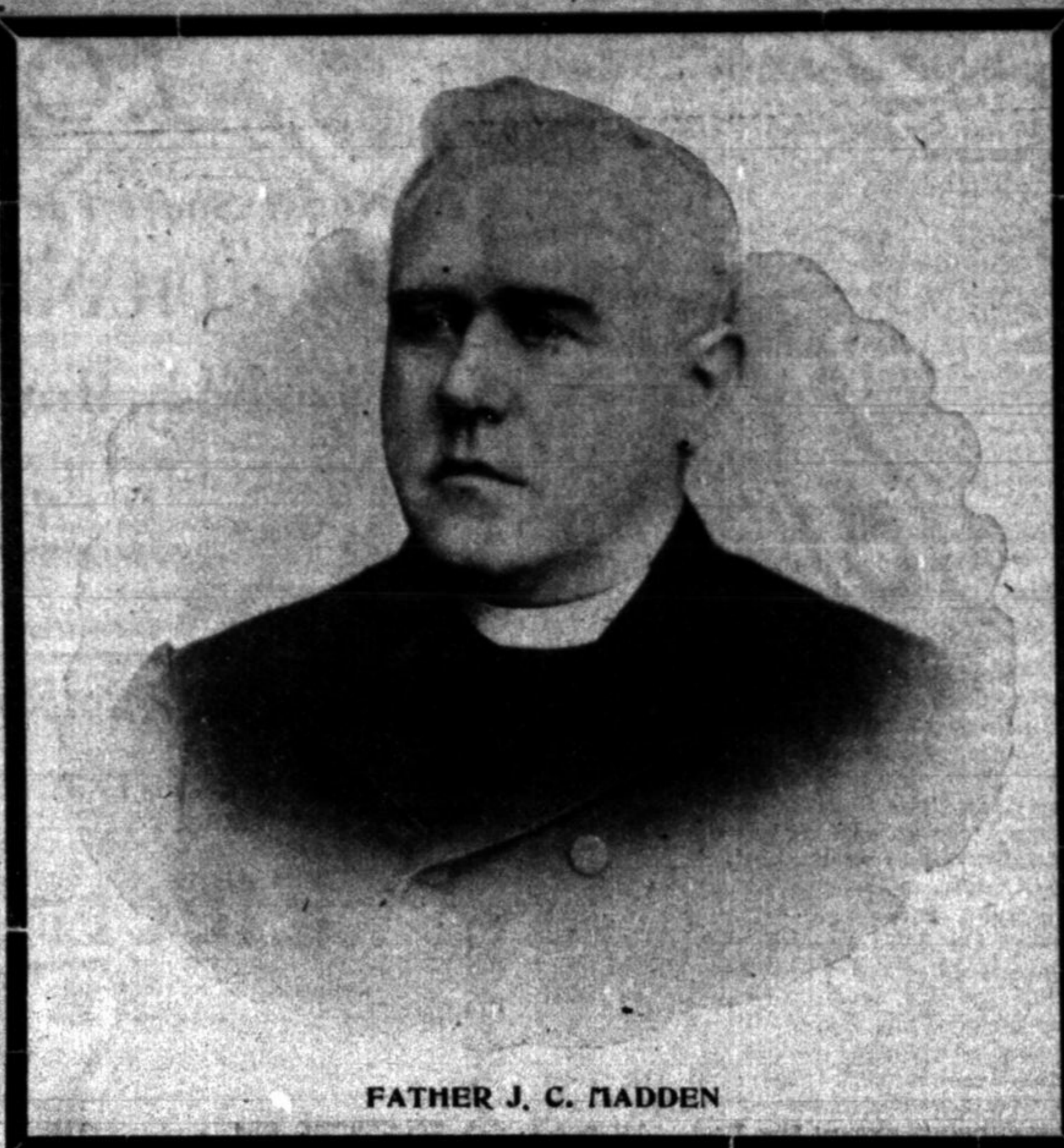
The Highland Park club will give its opening reception and dance of the season, Friday evening, October 10, and the entertainment committee hope to make it a very brilliant social event.

FATHER J. C. MADDEN

The sad intelligence that Father Madden, the venerable pastor of St. Mary's Church, had passed away was received with inexpressible sorrow, not only by the members of his pastoral charge, but by the entire community, where he was known and beloved by all. His death occurred after a long illness, at the parochial residence, in Highland Park, Ill., Tuesday noon, September 30, 1902.

The funeral services were held from St. Mary's Church, Thursday morning, October 2, and were most impressive; the interment was at Calvary.

Long before the hour of the ceremony the church was filled with friends from near and far, Catholic and protestant alike, coming to pay their last tribute. Solemn requiem high mass was celebrated at 10 o'clock, with Very Rev. Dean Gavin, of Waukegan, as the celebrant; Deacon, Rev. Hugh O'Gara McShane, LL. D., pastor of the Annunciation church, Chicago; Sub-Deacon, Rev. J. E. Madden, of St. Gabriel's church, Chicago; Master of Ceremonies, Rev. P. F. A. Byrne, rector at Chicago Heights; Thurifer, Rev. J. Kieley, former assistant at Highland Park.

Rev. B. P. Murray, pastor of St. Bernard's church, in a short funeral sermon paid fitting tribute to the beautiful life and character of the saintly, gentle prelate, who by his ready sympathy and kind heart, had endeared himself to one and all.

The requiem music by the choir was exceedingly fine, and a very beautiful "Ave Maria" was rendered

by Mr. Schneider at the offertory.

The honorary pall-bearers were: Messrs. J. Flood, E. Griffin, P. C. Conway, E. A. Murphy, S. P. Maloney and Rev. T. E. Judge; and Messrs. John Finney, Sebastian Stipe, Michael Sweeney, William Mockler, John Mooney, James Gentry, John Duffy and James Fitzgerald officiated as active pall-bearers.

Father Madden is survived by one sister, Miss Cecelia Madden.

Until a successor shall be appointed the present incumbent, Rev. J. J. Morrissey will take charge of St. Mary's parish, to which he recently came from Chicago.

[Father Madden was born in Ballyshannon, County Donegal, Ireland, in 1830. After a successful course at Maynooth, the great Irish ecclesiastical college, he was ordained to the priesthood in 1851, and appointed to the Raphoe diocese. For twenty years he was pastor there, and then, yielding to the demand for priests in America, he came to the States as pastor at St. Patrick's Church, Columbus, Ohio. In 1883, at the invitation of his distinguished fellow student at Maynooth, Most Rev. Dr. Feehan, Father Madden associated himself with the archdiocese of Chicago. Since then he has been pastor at St. Charles, Ill., at Lake Forest and at Highland Park. He was a priest of the old school, a man of refined taste and excellent and wide learning. He was thoroughly devoted to the calling of his choice, and was deservedly looked up to and respected by all the inhabitants of Highland Park, irrespective of religious belief.]
