The week has been unusually quiet at Skokie, and as to brilliant social entertainments the season is practically over.

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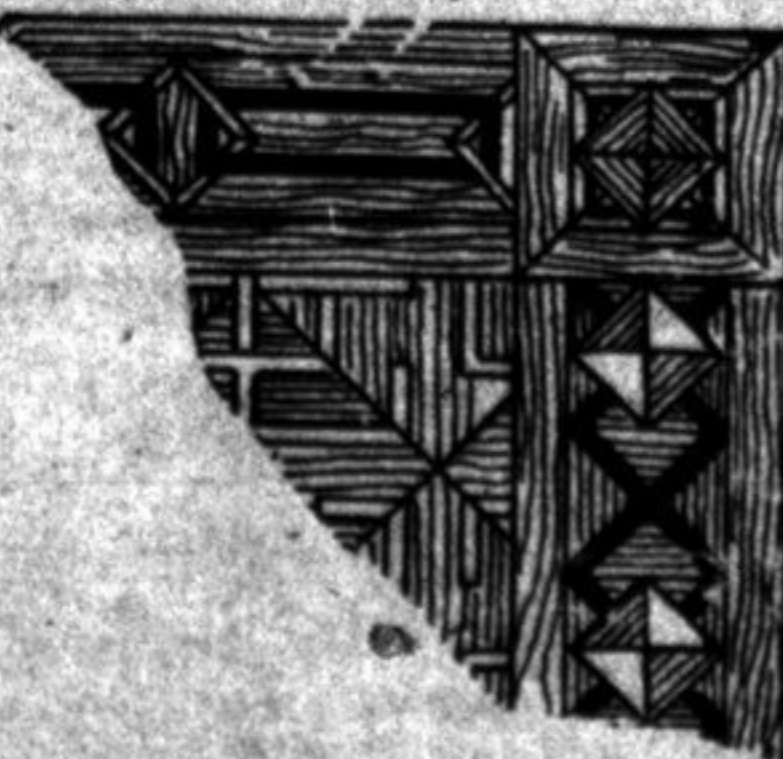
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
