Anticipation often surpasses realization, but not so with St. Mary's bazaar, as everyone will tell who was there opening night. No end of pretty and useful articles are displayed in the attractively arranged booths. Father Morrissey has certainly proved a successful master of ceremonies, for nothing has been left undone that will contribute to the pleasure of those attending the bazaar and give them their full money's worth. Monday evening, November 11, will be "Forester night." The Foresters will act as hosts and a number of the high court officers from the city are expected out to grace the occasion with their presence. D. 1902, or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit.
