Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered that a cast-iron lateral main water supply pipe, four inches internal diameter, be constructed and laid along and under Laurel avenue in the City of Highland Park, connecting with the water main on McGovern street, thence westerly along the northerly side of said Laurel avenue for a distance of six hundred and ninety feet from place of beginning, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City, and having applied to the County Court of Lake County for an assessment of the costs of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment thereof having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the Seventeenth day of November, A. D. 1902, or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit.

Said assessment is payable in Five installments with interest at the rate of five (5) per centum per annum, on all installments except the first. All persons desiring may file objections in said court before said day, and may appear on the hearing and make their defense.
