WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE BILL.

February 4, 1903, will be a red-letter day for the women's organizations of Illinois, for on that day, at 2:30 p. m., the senate and house election committees will hold a joint session to listen to arguments in favor of the tax-paying woman-suffrage bill, introduced in the house January 22, by Representative Owen. Five minute speeches from fifteen different women whose organizations are interested in the bill, will make a brilliant and varied program.
