**WHY NOT MAKE THE ENTIRE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK A GRAMMAR SCHOOL DISTRICT?**

Do you think it pays a community to have good schools?

If so, do you know any good reason why the people of the City of Highland Park living north of a line drawn east and west along the center of Ravine and Deerfield avenues should have better schools than the people living south of that line?

Probably not. Then, supposing you live south of that line, are you willing to pay fifteen or twenty per cent more taxes than you do at present, in order to obtain as good school privileges for your children as the children of your neighbors across the line enjoy? In other words, do you want up to date educational advantages for your children bad enough to pay for them what they are worth?

The present tax rate in District 107 is \$9.34 per \$100.; in District 108 it is \$7.89, a difference of 15½ per cent.

These questions are right up to you now. An opportunity is offered to you which must be seized quickly, if at all.

The Board of Education for District 107, embracing the north part of the City of Highland Park, has called an election to decide this question, so far as the residents of that district can decide it, for Saturday, February 28, 1903.

The residents of that part of District 108, lying in the southern part of the City of Highland

Park, are now preparing a petition to the School Trustees of this township for the same purpose.

If the election in District 107, and the petition in District 108, carry for the proposed enlarged school district it will shortly become a fact. If the election and petition for that purpose do not carry at this time the decision against the proposition will probably render the formation of such a school district impossible for many years to come. Therefore, if you conclude after a due consideration of the matter, that the entire community would profit by the formation of such a new and enlarged school district, it is highly desirable for the sake of the children, whose education depends upon your judgment, that you should act promptly in the matter, and make your influence felt in carrying through the election and the petition.

The City of Highland Park has better lights, better streets, better walks, better fire protection than it had a year ago, and all these advantages are enjoyed in greater
