

**PRECEDENT BY PRESIDENT.**

President Roosevelt has set apart a room adjoining his own office in the White House for the exclusive use of the press.

This is the first time in the history of the United States that this has been done by a president.

In the new office building west of the White House the correspondents have a separate room provided with a huge oak table, chairs and three telephones for their convenience. The newspaper men are jubilant over securing these

model quarters and say that the president couldn't have possibly made them any more convenient.

The room adjoins the big central waiting room where all callers gather before they are admitted to the offices of the president or Secretary Cortelyou.

The door of the press room stands open and the man of consequence in politics, business or rank who escapes being interviewed is fleet of foot indeed.

In the White House, before it underwent its remodeling process, when the president and his clerical forces were all quartered on the second floor, the newspaper men whose duties took them there, were obliged to content themselves with a table placed at the eastern end of the general waiting-room.

They had no telephone at their disposal and when they wished to call up their respective offices were obliged to go into the "War Room" and ask permission to use the wire. This telephone was often busy at the very time the newspaper men wished to use it most, and the amount of suppressed warmth that frequently resulted would have been sufficient to heat the White House for some months to come.

President Roosevelt has appointed several of his newspaper friends to good positions and favors dozens of them with his political confidence. When the new office building was planned, it was quite natural therefore, that the president should order a "press room" in the most convenient location.
