Both the National and Confederate governments were anxious to hold West Virginia. The majority of the people favored the Union cause. The Confederate forces began operations in the state on May 26, 1861, and the Union forces were ordered to oppose them the following day. Gen. Mc-Clellan was assigned to the command of the Union forces and continued in command until relieved by Gen. Rosecrans. While no severe battles occurred, the struggle for supremacy in West Virginia continued through-cut the greater part of 1861, and was attended by many small encounters, the result of which generally brought rejoicing throughout the north.
