IMPROVEMENT AT POWER HOUSE.

With the coming of warmer weather the Electric Railway Company is making several additions and improvements in its power plant at Highwood. R. A. These and other changes will be made in order that the plan for a considerable increase of speed along the line may be executed. New motor boxes are being placed in the cars and every effort will be made to have the road in model condition this summer.

TO IMPROVE RAILWAY MEN'S HOME AT HIGHLAND PARK.

As a result of the general action on the part of the Order of Railway Conductors, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, the Home for Aged and Disabled Railway Employees of America, located in our city, is to have a new building and is to be provided with a regular annual income or its maintenance.

The present home has been supported entirely by voluntary contributions from the various divisions of the several unions which have been liberal, but rather spasmodic, and it has become more evident each year that the home ought to have a regular and dependable income. The inadequacy of the present quarters has also become more and more apparent.

Three of the organizations having voted an aggregate of \$75,000 the erection of a new home is assured. The heads of the three interested orders will each appoint a member of his respective organization, who, with the heads, will form a committee of six, which will secure bids and have charge of all the preliminary work for new buildings.

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
