DEATH OF OF MRS. HOPKINS.

Mrs. Delia J. Hopkins, mother of Mrs. Fred J. Schumacher, died at the home of her daughter on Park avenue Tuesday, June 2d, after a severe illness of about a month's duration, though her health had been failing for over a year. Some two or three weeks ago, as a last resort, she went to the Augustana hospital for an operation, after which she was brought back to her daughter's home and survived only a week. The physicians told them at the outset there was scarce a possibility of her recovery. She was 61 years of age, and leaves, besides Mrs. Schumacher, a daughter, Mrs. Gay S. Ames, in Montana, and a son, Byron J. Hopkins in Michigan.

Her life as a young woman was passed in Holland, Mich., where she knew pastor Pfaustiehl as a little boy and where she met and married Mr. J. Hopkins. It was a rare coincidence that the little boy whom she as a young girl rocked in his cradle should grow up and become her pastor in her later life, and finally conduct her funeral services, as he did Thursday afternoon at Mr. Schumacher's home and then follow her remains to Lake Forest for interment. Another striking fact was that her funeral was exactly on the fiftieth anniversary of her marriage.

She was a woman of rare personal qualities of mind and heart and made every life with which she came in contact, happier and better. One of her last requests was that her daughter sing, "I am the Child of a King," which was also sung at her funeral. Pastor Pfanstiehl's eulogy was eminently true and deserved, and he spoke from the knowledge of a life long acquaintance.
