**Automobilists Discontinue Runs on Account of Autocratic Rules of North Shore Villages.**

Manager Stevens, of the Highland Park Hotel, received the following letter this week which speaks for itself:

Chicago, June 13, 1903.  
Manager Highland Park Hotel,  
Highland Park, Ill.

Dear Sir:—We find on investigation that most frivolous and imbecile rules reducing the speed to eight miles an hour through the town along the North Shore route and the annoyance of officers of the different villages to automobilists while traveling, find out that the speed renders it impossible for us to continue the proposed runs along the North Shore that we had scheduled for the coming season. Therefore we shall cancel all such runs and tours to other directions. I wish therefore, to inform you of our decision that you may not prepare for us next Sunday.
