CITY COUNCIL.

Council met in regular session last Tuesday night. After the payment of bills alderman Murphy introduced an ordinance lim-

iting the speed of autos to eight miles per hour within the city limits, which was passed. The tax levy ordinance was also passed levying \$2,000 for corporate purposes. There were three bidders for the construction of sidewalks as advertised. Two of them being the lowest and the same, the clerk was directed to re-advertise for bids to be held Friday night. The question of settlement with James Huxtable and son for extras on the Lake View and Walker avenue private sewer then came up and the clerk was directed to request engineer Winds of Winnetka, and ex-marshal Moore to attend the meeting Friday night when Mr. Huxtable would try to show the council why they should pay him \$84.15 more in addition to the \$1200 already spent by the city (then village) for the benefit of a few.

FRIDAY EIGHT P. M.

Council met as per adjournment. Contract for construction of plank walk 5 feet 4 inches wide on Clay avenue at 38 cents per foot and 4 foot walk on Washington avenue at 32 cents, awarded to John Carlborn. The question of settlement with Mr. Huxtable was then cussed and discussed for an hour and a half without any agreement being reached. Marius Hanson presented a petition to the council complaining that the electric road refused to stop cars at Turner street on Sundays and holidays. On motion of alderman Rettig the petition was referred to the Street R. R. Co., with a request for an immediate reply. Adjourned to next regu-meeting July 28th.

FORT SHERIDAN PARK.

SEC. 2. All unexpended balances of any item or items of any general appropriation made by this ordinance may be expended in making up any deficiency in any item or items in the same general appropriation and for the same general purpose or in a like appropriation made by this ordinance.

SEC. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith shall be and the same hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
