FAIR OFFICIALS ARE JUBILANT.

View With Satisfaction Prospects and Growing Interest Predict Unprecedented Attendance.

These are busy days for President Miller, Secretary Churchill and the fair directors. Besides the hundred and one minor details to be arranged for the Golden Anniversary of the Lake County Fair is the essential and more important task each officer has undertaken, that of awakening interest among farmers and exhibitors, and good results are already apparent.

Secretary Churchill is in correspondence with owners of some of the finest herds of cattle in northern Illinois who anticipate exhibiting here this year, besides breeders of prize winning horses whom heretofore he has been unable to interest, to say nothing of inquiries he is receiving from intending exhibitors in all the other classes. He believes it will be a phenomenal year in exhibits and that the enlarged premium awards will attract those who in past years refused to "show."

President Miller is attending to transportation facilities. He learns from officials of the new electric road that the line will open September 1, beyond every possible doubt. Tickets are now being printed for the new division, the trolley wire is all up, and road-bed receiving the final leveling up.

PREMIUMS FOR BABIES.

Besides special features such as the Boyes family of renowned serial artists who give two half hour performances daily, the hurdle race, ladies brass band, etc., will be a baby show with cash awards for prettiest and nicest babies under one year old. Three ladies are to be appointed to take charge of the baby show, which will probably occur on Thursday of fair week.

There will be some great games of base ball, a number of the best teams in the county having signified their intention of competing for the \$50 purse, to which is added entrance fees.

Of course the speed program will prove an attraction transcending all others, and previous track records are sure to be lowered this year. The running races will be exciting, as the horses

already practically entered insure some great contests.

All roads will lead to the great Lake County fair in another short two weeks and you will miss the best one of the preceding fifty if you fail to attend. Every day will be a big day this year.

THAT OAK TREE.

Last week we protested against the removal from the sidewalk line of that large white oak in front of Mrs. Floyd's. We have since learned that the street and alley committee practically yielded to a public demand in ordering it removed, especially that part of the public which belongs to the Highland Park club. The patrons of the club have long complained of it as standing in the middle of the walk and many a member has run up against that tree dark nights to their hurt. We trust these folk's social pleasures at the club house, did nothing to prevent their seeing a full sized oak tree in season to avoid it. Some people can see snakes when they can't see a 15 inch white oak tree.

But further the committee aver that a white oak will soon die if a sidewalk is built around it and cite numerous examples here in town, ail of which is true. As a matter of fact unless that walk had been carried several feet away from the tree it probably would not have lived five years. White oaks like some people, can't endure civilization. All over the east side are short stumps and holes in the cement walks, because a white oak tree was left when the walk was built.
