The loving care of an aged mother who mourns her loss, her devotion to her home, her love and tender bringing up of her son, her happy married life, her unselfish devotion to her husband who for the past two years has been a physical sufferer, marked her as one whom the world can ill-afford to lose, but a fell disease seized her, which for a year or more preyed upon her, and after lingering upon a bed of sickness for seven weeks she passed away peacefully to her heavenly home last Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

**NOTICIE FOR LETTING CONTRACT**

Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highland Park.

Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for the grading, draining, paving and otherwise improving of First street, Oak and Oakwood Avenues in the City of Highland Park, commencing at the southerly line of Elm place, thence southerly along said First street across Walnut Avenue to Oak Avenue, thence southerly on Oak Avenue to Oakwood Avenue and thence southerly on Oakwood Avenue to its junction with the easterly line of the Green Bay road, as a whole, in accordance with the ordinance therefor. Said bids will be opened on the 16th day of September, A. D. 1903, at the hour of 3 p. m. at the office of the Board of Local Improvements of said City in City Hall.

The specifications for such improvement and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the City Clerk of Highland Park in the City Hall.

The contractor will be paid in improvement bonds, which bonds will draw interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum.

All proposals or bids must be accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the President of the Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highland Park for a sum of not less than 10 per centum of the aggregate of the proposal. Said proposals or bids must be delivered to the President of the Board of Local Improvements in open session of said board at the time and place fixed herein for opening the same. No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a check as herein provided.

The Board of Local Improvements reserve the right to reject any or all bids should they deem it best for the public good.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a bond equal to twenty-five (25) per centum of the contract price of some approved surety company guaranteeing said improvement against defects arising from poor material or poor workmanship, for a period of two years from the date of the completion and acceptance thereof.

**AN ORDINANCE**

Levying taxes for corporate purposes for the fiscal year from May 1st, 1903 to April 30, 1904.

Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That whereas the total amount of all appropriations legally made for all corporate purposes and to be collected from the tax levy of the fiscal year of said city, ending April 30, 1904, having been ascertained by said City Council to be the sum of nineteen thousand three hundred and two (\$19,302.00) dollars, and the purpose for which said appropriations are made and the sum or amount appropriated for each purpose being as follows:

STREET AND BRIDGES.	
For constructing, repairing and maintaining streets and bridges.....	\$2,500.00
SEWERS	
For constructing, repairing and maintaining sewers.....	550.00
STREET LIGHTING	
For street lighting for year....	3,307.00
PRINTING AND STATIONERY	
For printing and stationery purposes.....	125.00

LIBRARY	
For public library purposes....	1,200.00
SALARY OF OFFICERS	
For salary of City officers....	4,220.00
BOND AND INTEREST	
For bonding indebtedness and interest falling due.....	6,750.00
MISCELLANEOUS	
For miscellaneous corporate purposes not herein above enumerated.....	450.00
FIRE DEPARTMENT	
For meeting contingencies....	200.00
Total appropriated.....	\$19,302.00

Now therefore said City Council does hereby levy said nineteen thousand three hundred and two dollars upon all property subject to taxation within said city as the same is assessed and equalized for state and County purposes for the current year, as the City taxes for the City of Highland Park for said year ending April 30, 1904.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk is hereby directed to file a copy of this ordinance, duly certified, with the County Clerk of Lake County, State of Illinois, before September 12, 1903.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
