

## AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance, concerning the taking of sand and gravel from public property in the city of Highland Park, in the county of Lake, and State of Illinois.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Highland Park, in the county of Lake and State of Illinois:

**SECTION 1.** That no person or persons, firm or corporation shall take, haul, carry away, or remove, any sand or gravel, or any material containing either sand or gravel, or both, off of or from any street, avenue, public alley or public highway in said city of Highland Park, and any person or persons, firm, or corporation who shall, either as principal or agent, violate the provisions of this section, shall be fined in the sum of not less than five dollars (\$5.00), nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each offense.

**SECTION 2.** That no person or persons, firm or corporation shall take, haul, carry away or remove any sand, gravel, or any material containing either sand or gravel, or both, off of or from any public park or grounds dedicated or used for public purposes, or for the benefit of the public of said city, or off of or from any public property of said city of Highland Park, except off of or from the property known as the public park or picnic grounds in said city, and described as block twenty eight (28) in the recorded plat of the city of Highland Park, as platted, and recorded by the Highland Park Building Company upon the records of the recorder's office of Lake County, Illinois, May 8, A. D. 1869, and then only from such part of said block and grounds, and the accretions thereto, as lie between the bottom of the bluff of said grounds and the water's edge of Lake Michigan, and at such points in said space as may be designated by the Superintendent of Water Works of the city of Highland Park, and then only subject to the terms, conditions, and provisions hereinafter expressed.

**SECTION 3.** Any and all persons desiring to obtain sand or gravel from the property referred to in section (2) of this ordinance, shall apply to the city clerk for a permit to take the same stating to the city clerk the number of loads of said sand or gravel desired by them, and whether said sand or gravel is to be used within or without the limits of the city, and said permit, when issued, shall specify the article to be taken, whether sand or gravel, and to whom such permit is issued, and whether said sand or gravel is to be used within or without the city, and said permit shall be good for the space of thirty days from the date of issue and thereafter shall be null and void. All persons applying for permits shall pay to the city clerk for such permit, at the time of receiving the same, the sum of ten cents in the case of each load of sand to be used within the city limits, and fifteen cents in the case of each load of gravel to be used within said limits, and twenty cents in the case of each load of sand to be used without said limits, and thirty cents in the case of each load of gravel to be used without said limits, and there shall be a separate permit for each load.

**SECTION 4.** All persons, shall, at the time of taking sand or gravel from said property referred to in section two of this ordinance, and before each load is removed from said property, deliver his permit to the Superintendent of Waterworks, or to the person then in charge of the waterworks at the pumping station of said city, located upon said block twenty-eight (28) aforesaid.

**SECTION 5.** Said superintendent of Waterworks shall deliver said permits to the City Treasurer, taking his receipt therefor, and it shall be the duty of the city treasurer to deliver said permits to the city clerk, who shall receive and cancel the same and pay over to the city treasurer the sums paid therefor.

**SECTION 6.** The city clerk shall

provide himself with a proper book, which shall contain blank permits, attached to blank stubs, and on each permit shall fill in the same, signing his name thereto, filling in the date, number of permit, name of person to whom issued, the kind of material desired, whether sand or gravel, and where to be used, whether inside or outside of the corporate limits of said city, and said permits shall be numbered consecutively, and said stubs shall be filled in with corresponding data. All permits, when surrendered to the city clerk, shall be filled by him with other papers and files of the city, after having been carefully compared with the proper stubs, and said city clerk shall make a report once each month of his doings under this ordinance.

**SECTION 7.** A load of sand or gravel shall consist of one cubic yard and no more, and in no case shall a permit be issued for any less quantity.

**SECTION 8.** No sand or gravel of said city shall be allowed to leave said city, either by water on Lake Michigan or by railroad, except by special authority of the city council, to be granted only on the written application of the party desiring to obtain it.

**SECTION 9.** The banking of sand or gravel upon said block twenty-eight (28), while not prohibited, shall not entitle the person so doing to the exclusive right to such sand or gravel so banked.

**SECTION 10.** Any person violating the provision of this ordinance, where no other penalty is specified, shall be fined, on conviction, in a sum of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense.

**SECTION 11.** That chapter 44 of an ordinance of said city entitled "An ordinance revising and consolidating the General ordinance of the city of Highland Park, County of Lake, and State of Illinois," passed April 29, 1898, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

**SECTION 12.** This ordinance shall take effect and be in force, from and after its passage and publication.
