## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING AND ELECTION

Notice is hereby given, to the legal Voters and Electors of the Town of Deerfield, in the County of Lake, and State of Illinois, that the Annual Town Meeting and Election of Officers of said Town will take place TUESDAY, the Fifth Day of APRIL, A. D., 1904, being the first Tuesday in said month.

The Election will begin at the hour of 7 a. m., and close at 5 p. m., in the places designated as follows :

1st Precinct, Prior's Building, Sheridan Road, North of Central Ave. Highland Park.

2nd Precinct, City Hall, Ft. Sheridan

3rd Precinct, Fire Dept. Building, Central Ave., Highland Park.

The officers to be elected are : 1 Assistant Supervisor, 1 Town Clerk, 1 Assessor, 1 Collector, 2 Commissioners of Highways, 1 Justice of the Peace.

## THE WOMAN'S CLUB.

Tuesday was the last session for the season. On review of the year the Club found itself in splendid shape as to membership, material equipment of their rooms, etc., and finances, having on hand some funds in the bank. The winter has been a pleasant, profitable and highly successful one, but there was one cloud on their horizon; Mrs. Fessenden, their life long president, finds herself unable to carry on the work for another year in the aggressive, strenuous way she has been doing it all these five years of the Club's history. Of course, the members are very reluctant to give up her services. They feel that she, more than any one else, is the creator and guide of the Club and should be retained. Hence the anxious thought and wise planning of last Tuesday.

With a membership of nearly one hundred active, energetic Highland Park women and five years of valuable experience back of them, a wise solution of the problem was reached. The Club will not let Mrs. Fessenden go; they will change the program

for a year and give her a rest. The character of the meetings will be changed so as to relieve the president of so much hard and incessant work; the labor of arranging for and conducting the meetings being divided among the members and probably most of the meetings will be held at their homes. This is not only practicable, but an excellent plan, as it will be a change, and a wise one, from the old stereotype method, however excellent it was.

## THE LIBRARY BUILDING.

The best site for the New Carnegie library building now in sight is the Erskine lot, at the corner of Laurel ave. and First street, with 100 feet front on First street, and 140 feet on Laurel ave. Some people object to it because it is so near the railroad, but I find many people on the East side who favor the plan, but when the west side aldermen all voted against the macadamizing of the Green Bay road, at the last Council meeting, the East side friends of the library began to "jump" on me for planing to locate the new building in a part of the town where the people opposed improved streets; said they did not want it where the streets were like country mud roads, etc., and they did not think Mr. Carnegie would like it there. Of course Mr. Carnegie must know about and approve the lot before he will pay over the money.

Now I, for one, do not believe my West side neighbors are opposed to improved streets. I believe they want the Green Bay road macadamized this season; and they also want Laurel and some others improved. The library board wish to decide on a location very soon and they are "up against" this situation and it is for the West side people to settle.
