The Inspecting General being at the Post, a practical fire alarm was sounded taking the soldiers off the field, and Highland Park claimed the game.

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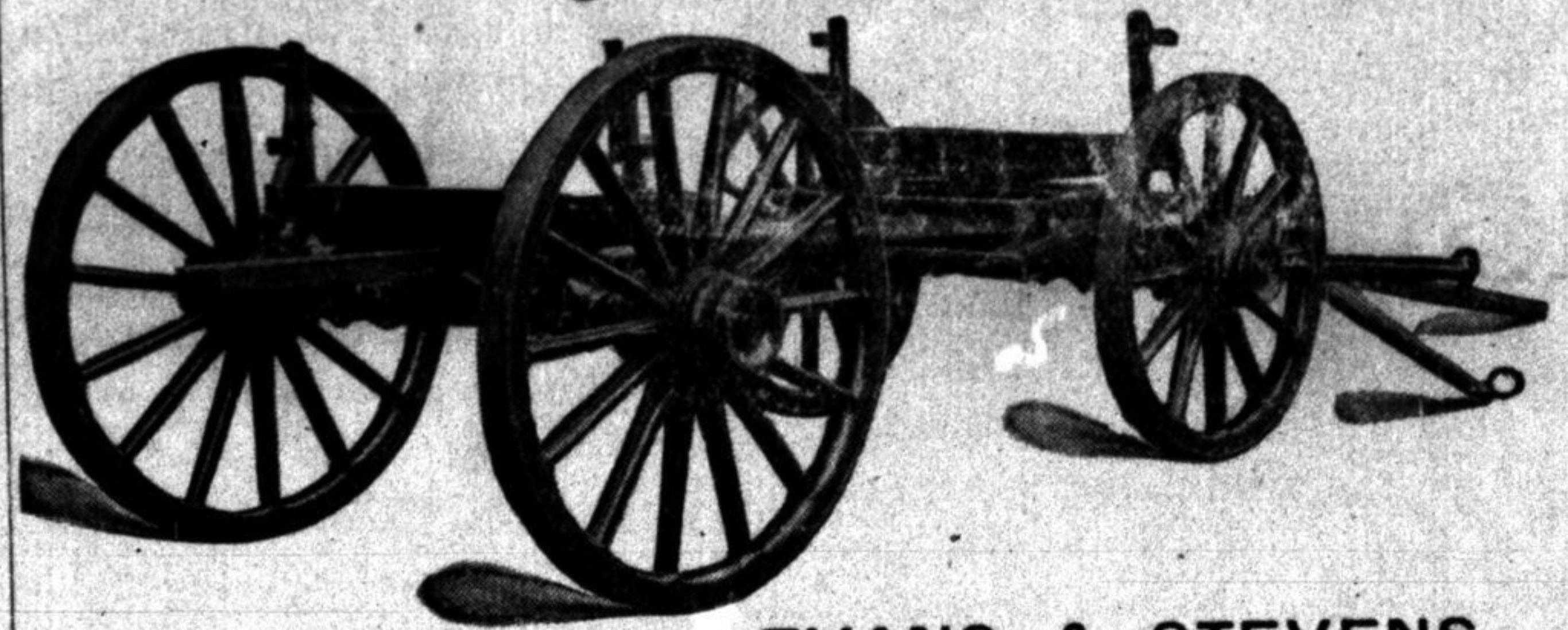
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
