### HAZEL PARK IMPROVEMENT.

As most people know, Hazel Park is that triangular shaped little park in front of the Episcopal, Baptist and Presbyterian churches. It is about 400 feet long and about 200 feet wide at the east end. The discussion of it as a place for the new Carnegie public library building has brought it into great prominence of late, and so at the council meeting last Tuesday evening Alderman Shields introduced the following preambles and resolutions for its improvement:

Whereas, Some of the property holders fronting on block 49, commonly known as Hazel Park, are opposed to the erection of a public library building on said park, and are desirous of maintaining said Hazel Park simply and only in its pristine state.

Whereas, Said park is public property, in which all the people of Highland Park are mutually interested, enfeoffed, and are, therefore, entitled to some use and benefit from said park; be it, therefore,

Resolved, That it is the sense of this council that steps be taken at once to improve said park, in the usual and befitting manner, obtaining in similar parks in other cities, by the erection of a band stand the installing of a fountain, the laying out of walks, the placing of a sufficient number of rustic seats and benches to accommodate the tired and rest seeking public, and installing swings, merry go rounds, and other public attractions, such as will make Hazel Park a thing of beauty and a joy forever.

Resolved, further, That this entire matter be referred to the Police Committee, with instruction to report back to the council at the earliest possible day.
