Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for grading, paving with macadam and otherwise improving of Lake Place, in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake, and State of Illinois, from the southerly line of Central Avenue to the northerly line of Laurel Avenue as a whole, in accordance with the ordinance therefor. Said bids will be opened on the 23d day of July, A. D. 1904, at the hour of 4 p. m. at the office of the Board of Local Improvements in the City of Highland Park.

The specifications for such improvement and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the City Clerk in the City Hall.
