

Notice for Letting Contract

Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highland Park:

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested, that the bids for the construction of a connected system of sewers to be constructed in the said City of Highland Park, as follows, to-wit: A sewer eight (8) inches internal diameter shall begin at a manhole located in the bottom of the ravine, crossing block thirty-three (33) in the City of Highland Park, located at the present terminus of the sewer in said ravine, terminating at or near the northeast corner of lot two (2) in said block thirty-three (33), thence said sewer shall run south forty-nine degrees, three minutes west, ninety-eight and five-tenths (98 5-10) feet; thence said sewer shall run south nine degrees, forty-four minutes west, one hundred and seven (107) feet; thence said sewer shall run south fifty-six degrees, thirty-two minutes west, one hundred and twenty-seven (127) feet; thence said sewer shall run south thirty-five degrees, thirty-seven minutes west, one hundred and seven (107) feet; thence said sewer shall run south fifty-five degrees, forty-seven minutes west, two hundred and three (203) feet; thence said sewer shall run north fifty-three degrees, forty-two minutes west, one hundred and thirty-five (135) feet; thence said sewer shall run south eighty-two degrees, thirty (30) minutes west, one hundred and twenty-five (125) feet; thence said sewer shall run north thirty-five degrees, twenty-two minutes, one hundred and eighty (180) feet; thence said sewer shall run south seventy-seven (77) degrees, fifty-three minutes west, two hundred and ninety-three (293) feet; thence said sewer shall run south sixty-two degrees, thirty-eight minutes west, one hundred (100) feet; thence said sewer shall run south twelve degrees, eighteen minutes, one hundred and seventy-two (172) feet; thence said sewer shall run south four degrees, six minutes west, one hundred and eight (108) feet; thence said sewer shall run south thirty-one degrees, twenty-five minutes east, one hundred and thirty (130) feet; thence said sewer shall run south seventeen degrees, forty-one minutes west, two hundred and forty-five (245) feet; thence said sewer shall run south fifty degrees, seventeen minutes west, one hundred and eighty (180) feet; thence said sewer shall run south seventy-four degrees, fifty-four minutes west to the center line of St. Johns Avenue; thence said sewer shall run south seventy-four degrees, fifty-four minutes west one hundred and thirty-two (132) feet; thence south thirty-three degrees, thirty-six minutes west, two hundred and seven (207) feet; thence south eighty-eight degrees, three minutes west, one hundred and sixty-six (166) feet; thence south forty-five degrees, fifty-four minutes west, ninety-two (92) feet, to the center line of St. Johns Place; thence south one degree east along the center line of St. Johns Place, to the center line of Vine Avenue; thence east along the center line of Vine Avenue two hundred and ninety (290) feet, at which point said sewer shall end.

A six-inch sewer shall begin from and connecting with the said eight-inch sewer above described, at the point where the center line of the alley in block thirty-five (35) in said city intersects said eight-inch sewer, and shall run south along the center line of said alley to the north line of lot one (1) in said block thirty-five (35) produced in its course across said alley.

A six-inch sewer shall begin from and connecting with the above described eight-inch sewer at the point where the center line of St. John's Avenue intersects said sewer; and shall run thence southerly along the center line of St. Johns Avenue to the south line of lot seven (7) in said block thirty-five (35) produced in its course across said St. Johns Avenue.

A six-inch sewer shall be constructed from and beginning with the said six-inch sewer in St. Johns Avenue at a point where the center line of St. Johns Avenue intersects the center line of

Maple Avenue, produced in its course across said St. Johns Avenue, and shall run thence northeasterly along the center line of said Maple Avenue to a point in said center line one hundred and fifty (150) feet southwesterly from the intersection of the west line of Sheridan Road with the center line of said Maple Avenue, were opened on the 22nd day of September, A. D., 1904, and Edward M. Laing being the lowest responsible bidder, the contract was awarded to said Edward M. Laing on the 22nd day of September, A. D., 1904. Said bid is for the work as a whole and is as follows:

3,927.5 lineal feet of 8-inch sewer with house connection slants, @ 50c per foot.....	\$1,963.75
1,740 lineal feet of 6-inch sewer with house connection slants, @ 50c per foot.....	870.00
22 manholes @ \$30 each.....	660.00
4 flush tanks @ \$75 each.....	300.00
Total.....	\$3,793.75

The owners of a majority of the frontage of the lots and lands upon said line of sewers wherein said work is to be done may, within ten days from the date hereof, elect to take said work and enter into a written contract to do said work at ten per centum less than the price at which the same has been awarded.
