THE RAYMOND LECTURES.

Prof. Jerome K. Raymond of the University of Chicago, will give the second series of his course on European Capitals at the High School, October 14, and fortnightly thereafter. The lectures are illustrated with stereopticon slides, and will be as follows:

Nov. 11.—Rome: the Passing of Authority.

Nov. 25.—Copenhagen: the Progress of the North.

Dec. 9.—Berne: the Triumph

of Democracy.

Dec. 23.—Athens: the Revival of Hellenism.

The lectures draw large houses wherever given. Admission is by ticket only; no charge, however, is made for these, and course tickets may be had upon application to the Principal of the High School. Children under 14 must be accompanied by their parents. Judging by the number of persons asking for tickets, this course will be even more popular than that given last year at this time.

GENERAL POSTAL INFORMATION.

Under authority of an Act of Congress a pamphlet of general postal information has been issued. It contains the classification, conditions and postage rates for domestic and foreign mail matter. It is for free distribution to the public through postmasters. No copies will be supplied direct to the public from the department.

A supply of this pamphlet is sent to each postmaster as soon as practicable. Proper economy must be observed in the distribution and all waste must be avoided. As nearly as practicable one copy to each family and each business establishment within a postal district should be sufficient. They are free, and are served from the stamp window of the post office, but on request only.
