Board of Local Improvements of the city of Highland Park.
Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for the construction of a cast iron lateral main water supply pipe (4) four inches internal diameter, together with fire hydrants, shut-off valves and special castings, to be constructed and laid along and under Elm place and First street in the city of Highland Park, connecting with the water main now laid in Second street, at a point in said main 10 feet north of the center line of Elm place, thence easterly along said Elm place to a point 10 feet west of the center line of First street, thence northerly along First street to Vine avenue also on First street connecting with the water main on Onwentsia avenue, thence northerly on said First street to the north line of Lot 16, Block 6, of the Exmoor Addition to the city of Highland Park, as a whole, in accordance with the ordinance therefor. Said bids will be opened on the 20th day of October A. D. 1904, at the hour of 3 p. m. at the office of the Board of Local Improvements in said city.

The specifications for such improvement and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the city clerk in the City Hall Building.

The contractor will be paid in bond which bond will draw interest at the rate of five (5) per centum per annum. All proposals or bids must be accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the President of the Board of Local Improvements of the city of Highland Park for a sum not less than ten (10) per centum of the aggregate of proposal. Said proposals or bids must be delivered to the President of the Board of Local Improvements in open session of said board at the time and place fixed herein for opening the same. No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a check as herein provided.

The Board of Local Improvements reserve the right to reject any or all bids should they deem it best for the public good.
