**Death of Mrs. John Middleton.**

Mrs. Middleton, wife of ex-Mayor John Middleton, died early on the morning of October 17th. While her death was sudden it was not entirely unexpected as she had been failing for nearly a year.

She was born in New York City, April 14, 1824, and was married September 12, 1844. Mr. and Mrs. Middleton came to Chicago in 1855, and resided in Kenwood, corner of 48th street and Ellis avenue, until the spring of 1873, when they moved to their present home in the Park. A few weeks ago a very quiet celebration of their sixtieth wedding anniversary was held.

Mr. Middleton, two sons and a daughter survive. The funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the house. The burial was private at Lake Forest. Rev. Mr. Wolcott officiated.
