## HELEN MEEKER LYNCH, M. D.

The death of Dr. Lynch last Saturday, although long expected, came with a shock of grief to the community in which she had lived for so many years and to which she had endeared herself by her unselfish character, her womanly sympathy for all in distress, and by her professional skill, so freely offered to all in need of it:

It is more than a year since Dr. Lynch was compelled by the progress of the disease which terminated her life to give up her practice here in Highland Park, and since that time she has been a great sufferer, but to the end her courage and patience never faltered and she faced death with a cheerfulness and resignation which was characteristic of her noble spirit and was an inspiration to her friends.

Dr. Lynch was a native of New Jersey and spent the earlier years of her life in Minnesota and South Dakota. In 1890 she was graduated from the Hahnemann Medical College in Chicago, and soon after began her practice here in Highland Park, where from the first her skill was recognized and her womanly sympathy and high intelligence made every patient her devoted friend.

The funeral service Monday at Dr. Conger's residence was simple and dignified, as she desired to have it, and consisted only of the impressive burial office of the Anglican Church read by the rector of Trinity Church. The interment was at St. Paul, whither the body was escorted by Dr. Conger.

As the funeral procession passed to the station and awaited the ar-

rival of the train the closed stores and drawn shades along the route testified with mute eloquence to the fact that one has passed from us whom the whole community mourns and whose place will not soon be filled in our hearts. May she rest in peace.
