Many people do not know of the interesting and very instructive lectures given at the High School every two weeks. Mr. Raymond, Professor of Sociology at the Chicago University, has given three illustrated lectures and there are three more in the course. The next one will be December 9th at eight o'clock, in the Assembly Hall, the subject: "Copenhagen: The Progress of the North". Professor Raymond talks of these cities from a sociological point of view and touches upon the history of the country, and to hear these lectures is an educational opportunity not to be forgotten.

Mrs. G. H. Gilbert, the oldest actress in the world, died suddenly at the Sherman House in Chicago yesterday noon, after a very short illness. In her death the theatrical profession loses one of its most valued members, and theatergoers, to whom she had endeared herself, will feel the loss keenly. Mrs. Gilbert has been on the stage in Europe and America for nearly 60 years, and was making her farwell tour of America, it being also her first appearance as a star. She was 83 years of age, and has been on the stage almost continually since she was twenty-five.
