### At the Grammar School

Next week is Spring vacation. After that there are two school months of the year left, but the Board has decided to close school June 21. At that time it is planned to have formal dedication exercises to celebrate the completion of the new building. The public, however, will probably have more than one opportunity to less formal exercises in the building. The children have three morning assemblies in the auditorium now, and it is also being used for music rehearsals and calisthenic exercises.

Pupils and teachers alike are rejoicing over the possession of a fine stereopticon and an installment of slides. That we have been able to secure so much needed an equipment at this time is to quite an extent due to the initiative of Mr. Carleton Moseley, who urged the purchase of the instrument and started the fund with a subscription of twenty-five dollars. Through the Art League organization the school children raised over sixty dollars more. To this the Art League contributed from last year's funds enough to buy 150 slides. As a result we have the beginning of an equipment which will no doubt grow from year to year, and which will make posssble more effective school work than before.

The slides thus far purchased are all for immediate use in teaching geography. Scenes illustrating industries, such as lumbering, quarrying, the production of sugar, rice, cotton, etc., and primitive methods of industry, homes of various peoples, etc., have been purchased. When now a class is studying any subject which can be thus illustrated, the teacher can take the pupils to the auditorium and recitations will be supplemented by a study of the stereopticon views. The auditorium is wellequipped with opaque shades so that it con be completely darkened during bright daylight.

It can be readily seen how the work in geography, history, literature and nature study can be enriched by the use of the stereopticon. In fact the limit to its value depends only upon the equipment of slides. One plan which we hope to realize is to have a hundred slides illustrating the trees and plants and various features of the landscape in and around Highland Park.
