## Letter to Mr. H. S. Vail,

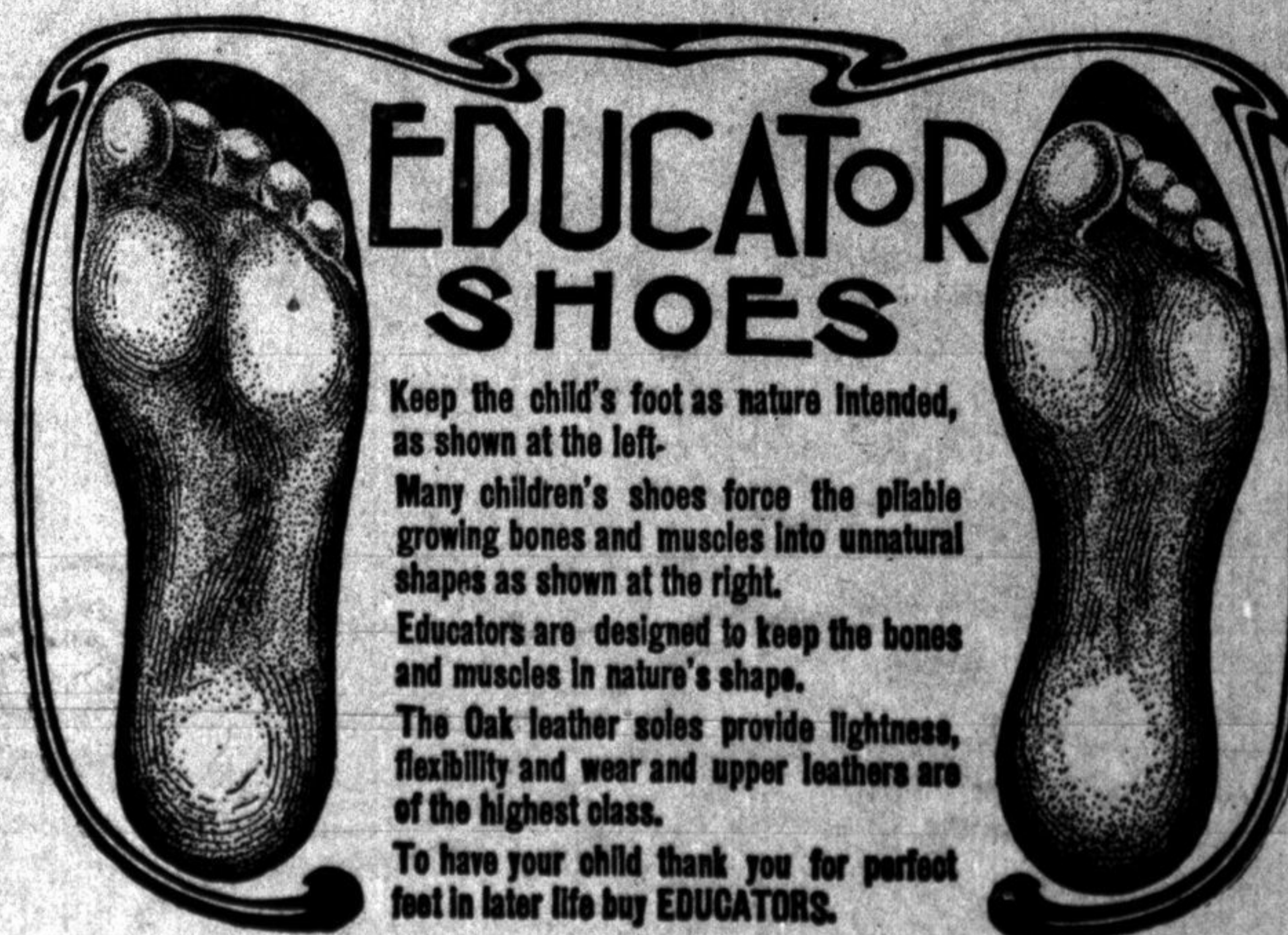
