Following the example of Ed. Jones and Harry Wicklander who left their positions with the electric road some time ago, Joseph Miller an old employe at the barns, resigned last week and has accepted a position with the Union Traction Co. in Chicago.

James Watson, Jr., who for a number of years past has been assistant to the plumber at the Post, passed a successful examination before the Civil Service Commission and has been assigned to Fort Moultrie, N. C., as Post plumber. On the eve of his departure a banquet was tendered him by a number of friends at Devine's Cafe.

Few people realize what a pleasant little place Fort Sheridan park really is. Practically all of the vegetation is natural and a finer little park, we think, would be hard to find. It is an ideal spot for a picnic and mothers will do well to take the children there for an outing. The band holds a concert from 3 until 4 o'clock every afternoon and in the evening. A high class vaudeville performance commences at 8:15 after which a dance is held in the splendid dancing pavillion.

Monday, June 12th is the date set for a recount of the ballots of both the city and town elections. Vencel Muzik, the defeated candidate, is contesting the election of Mayor Gibbs. John A. Burke asks a recount in the case of Constable John Devine. Both cases will be heard in the Circuit court at Waukegan. Attorney E. S. Gail represents the contestants, while Whitney and Orvis will look after the interests of the defendants.

SEWERAGE—Col. Yeatman, of Fort Sheridan, in his most recent communication to Mayor Gibbs on that subject, declares that the present method of disposing of this city's sewerage—that of dumping it into the ravine back of Fort Sheridan Park—will no longer be tolerated by the military authorities as it has become a nuisance that threatens the health of the entire community, and if not immediately abated, an injunction will be asked to enforce their demand.

By the close score of 1 to 0 Gibb's Colts defeated the Little Forts of Waukegan, on the government drill grounds last Sunday. The game was the best, and most hotly contested of any ever played by the Colts, and to say the boys did good work would be putting it mildly. The feature of the game was the pitching of Bert Adams, although each member of the team did his part when opportunity offered. The Colts are considering the advisability of contesting the Crescent's claims of superiority, and are not alone in the belief that such a game would prove very interesting.

Waukegan avenue must have sewerage, but it is really the only place in the city that would suffer without it. The only question is, where shall the outlet be? Two ways are open to the city. One is to connect with Highland Park at the viaduct on Railway avenue, for which privilege that city asks eight thousand dollars, but would probably accept six. The other is to build a line of sewers to the slough, where the city owns ten acres of land, purchased years ago for an outlet. The city council is divided on the question, Mayor Gibbs and others favoring going to the slough, while another faction would connect with Highland Park. Thus the matter stands while the Fort fires hot shot at short range.

Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for the construction of a cast iron lateral main water supply pipe, together with fire hydrant, shut off valves and special castings, to be constructed and laid along and under Linden avenue, in the city of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illi-

nois, commencing at the intersection of Linden avenue and Vine avenue and connecting with the water main now laid in Vine avenue at a point in said main twelve (12) feet east of the center line of Linden avenue, thence southerly along Linden avenue on a line parallel with the center line of said Linden avenue, to a point in said parallel line which would be intersected by the north line of lot six (6) in block twenty (20) in said City produced in its course across said avenue as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefore. Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for the construction of a cast iron lateral main water supply pipe, together with fire hydrant, shut off valves and special castings, to be constructed and laid along and under Lincoln Place, in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, commencing at and connecting with the water main now laid in Glencoe avenue at a point in said main which would be intersected by a line drawn parallel with and twenty (20) feet westerly from the center line of Lincoln Place, measuring at right angles to said center line, thence southerly along said Lincoln Place on said parallel line, to the northerly line of Lincoln avenue.
