When our present sewerage system was installed, it cost approximately \$1,600 and was paid for by all of the people while only a privileged few received any benefit. We now want a system whereby we shall all receive the greatest benefit. Loyal citizens of Highwood will be interested to know that the annual appropriation measure of \$2,000 was revoked this year and the sum of \$1,000 was substituted.

A certain statement at the council meeting was made by Judge Pease, in which he said that Highwood is the most law-abiding city of the two thousand cities which he has investigated. Nevertheless this statement is true for when we look back on the arrests made in Highwood during the past few years we realize that about ninety-nine per cent of the persons arrested were not residents of Highwood, but outsiders, who caused disturbances while passing through our city. Take for example a recent saloon robbery in which two citizens and two soldiers participated. The men who instigated the plot to rob were men from Highland Park and Lake Forest and not citizens of Highwood. The soldiers were prompted by these two unknown men and the former swore on the witness stand that one of the citizens had broke the padlock. Taking into consideration the fact that we have a number of saloons, one may well say we are law abiding citizens.
