Bazaar at the Orphanage

Next week Thursday at the Lake Bluff Orphanage will be held a bazaar for the benefit of the children's home. A year or so ago there was a question raised concerning these orphan children attending the Lake Bluff school because the town men had to pay the school tax for them. It resulted in these 125 destitute children being deprived of educational advantages, and other means of schooling had to be sought. William Deering of the Deering Harvester firm came to the rescue and furnished money for a school building on the grounds of the home. Now the trouble is equipment and teachers, so the money made at this bazaar goes for this school fund. This Orphan Home does one of the noblest works in this country and some of the children in it are picked up as orphans from our own county. The least we can do therefore is when these special needs are told to go with our spare change to these bazaars. There will be a sale of both fancy and useful articles in the afternoon and evening of Thursday, the 29th.

The ladies of Lake Bluff with the aid of a few others interested in this good work furnished a dinner at noon in the dining room of the Home and nothing gives more pleasure to the women in Highland Park than to take a trolley ride to Lake Bluff on Thursday next and to have dinner at the Orphanage, thereby adding 25c each 15c for children to the fund of the Home. Mrs. H. P. Davidson and Mrs. Samuel Parliament, both of Highland Park, are chairman of this enterprise and any donations either in fancy work or in the meat or grocery line given to them will be found very useful on that day.
