**Annual Appropriation Bill**

An ordinance making appropriations for corporate purposes for the City of Highwood for the fiscal year commencing May 1st, 1905, and ending April 30th, 1906.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Highwood County of Lake and State of Illinois:—

Section 1. That the following sums, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law be, and the same are hereby appropriated for corporate purposes for the City of Highwood, for the fiscal year commencing May 1st, 1905, and ending April 30th, 1906, as follows:—

For Police and Marshal	\$450.00
For Water fund	25.00
For Salaries of City Officers, except police and marshal	53.00
For public library	37.50
For interest on bonded indebtedness	125.00
For legal services	25.00
For City proportion of assessments	85.00
For Street and Alleys	200.00

Section 2. All unexpended balances at the end of said Fiscal Year of any item or items of any appropriations made by this ordinance may be expended in making up a deficiency in any item or items in any other of said general appropriations, or for the same general purposes and for any of said purposes may be transferred from any other fund or appropriation.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
