Mrs. Hayrick—No. He's got a beard.

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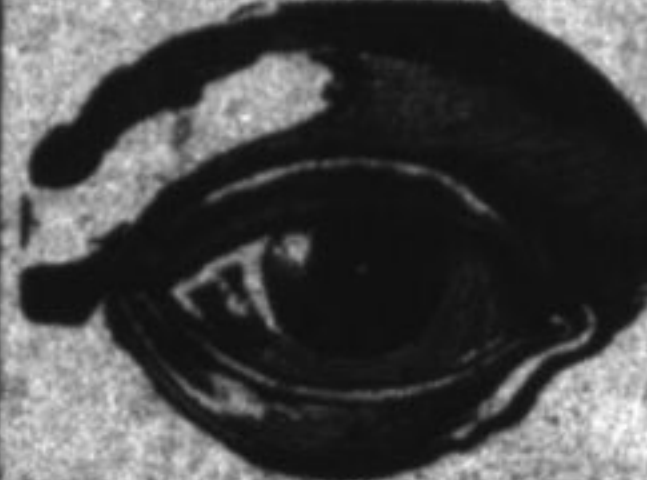
Dr. Green's Great Puzzle
