E, had been in Chicago Wednesday, returned home at night and found a civilian, Winthrop, visiting at his home. A quarrel ensued over the matter, and Winthrop ran down-stairs to obtain assistance from the other tenants of the house. While he was absent, Rock went into the bed room, and, loading his revolver, shot himself through the temples. He was taken to the Post Hospital, where he died Thursday morning. It was at first thought that Winthrop fired the fatal shot, but the testimony at the inquest showed beyond a doubt that the shot was self-inflicted.

Annual Appropriation Bill

An Ordinance making appropriations for corporate purposes for the fiscal year from May 1, 1905, to April 30, 1906

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:

Section 1. That the following sums or so much thereof as may be authorized by law be and the same is hereby appropriated for corporate purposes for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1905, and ending April 30, 1906:

Streets, Alleys and Bridges	
For constructing, maintaining and repairing streets, alleys and bridges	\$3,000 00
Sewers	
For constructing, maintaining and repairing sewers	700 00
Street Lighting	
For street lighting for one year	4,600 00
Library	
For Library purposes	1,200 00
Salary of Officers	
For salaries of city officers	5,792 00
Miscellaneous	
For miscellaneous purposes	241 00
Bond and Interest	
For bonded indebtedness and interest falling due	8,200 00
Total appropriated	\$23,823 00

Section 2. All unexpended balances of any item or items of any general appropriation made by this ordinance may be expended in making up any deficiency in any item or items in the same general appropriation and for the same general purpose or in like appropriation made by this ordinance.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

An Ordinance

An ordinance providing for the sale and conveyance of certain real estate belonging to the city of Highland Park, which is no longer necessary, appropriate, or required for the use of said city.

Whereas, The real estate hereinafter described and owned by the City of Highland Park, has been used and occupied as a public library site and has been under the custody and control of the Board of Directors of the Public Library, who have been conducting thereon a public library for the City of Highland Park, the said real estate having been purchased by said city for the use and benefit of the Public Library, and

Whereas, The Board of Directors of said Public Library, by a resolution duly adopted, have declared said site unfit and unsuitable as and for a public library site, and have purchased other property in said city as a public library site, upon which said Board has proceeded to erect a public library building, and the said council of said city is of the opinion that the real estate hereinafter described is no longer necessary, appropriate or required for the use of said City of Highland Park, or of said Public Library, or the Board of Directors thereof, and is no longer profitable to, nor its longer retention is for the best interests of said city; Therefore

Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake, and State of Illinois:

Section 1. That said real estate described as follows, to-wit: All that part of lot nine (9) in block twenty-two (22) in the City of Highland Park, described as follows: Commencing at the northwesterly corner of said lot, and running northeasterly along the northerly line of said lot to a point in said northerly line distant one hundred (100) feet westerly measuring along said northerly line, from the northeasterly corner of said lot, thence southeasterly on a line parallel with the easterly line of said lot a distance of eighty-four (84) feet nine and three eights inches (84 ft 9 3/8 in.), thence southwesterly parallel with the northerly line of said lot to the west line of said lot, being the east line of Sheridan Road, thence north along said west line of said lot to the place of beginning, and situated in the County of Lake, in the state of Illinois; together with all the improvements thereon, and all the rights, tenements, privileges, and appurtenances thereunto belonging, or in anywise appertaining, and now being used for a Public Library, be, and the same is hereby ordered to be sold to the highest and best bidder for cash.

Section 2. That bids or proposals for the purchase of said real estate shall be received up to the hour of eight o'clock P. M., of Tuesday, the Third day of October, A. D. 1905, and may be filed with the City Clerk, and that such bids shall be opened at the regular meeting of the city council of said city of Highland Park, to be held on Tuesday, the 3rd day of October, 1905.

Section 3. If any bid as aforesaid shall be accepted at said meeting whe
