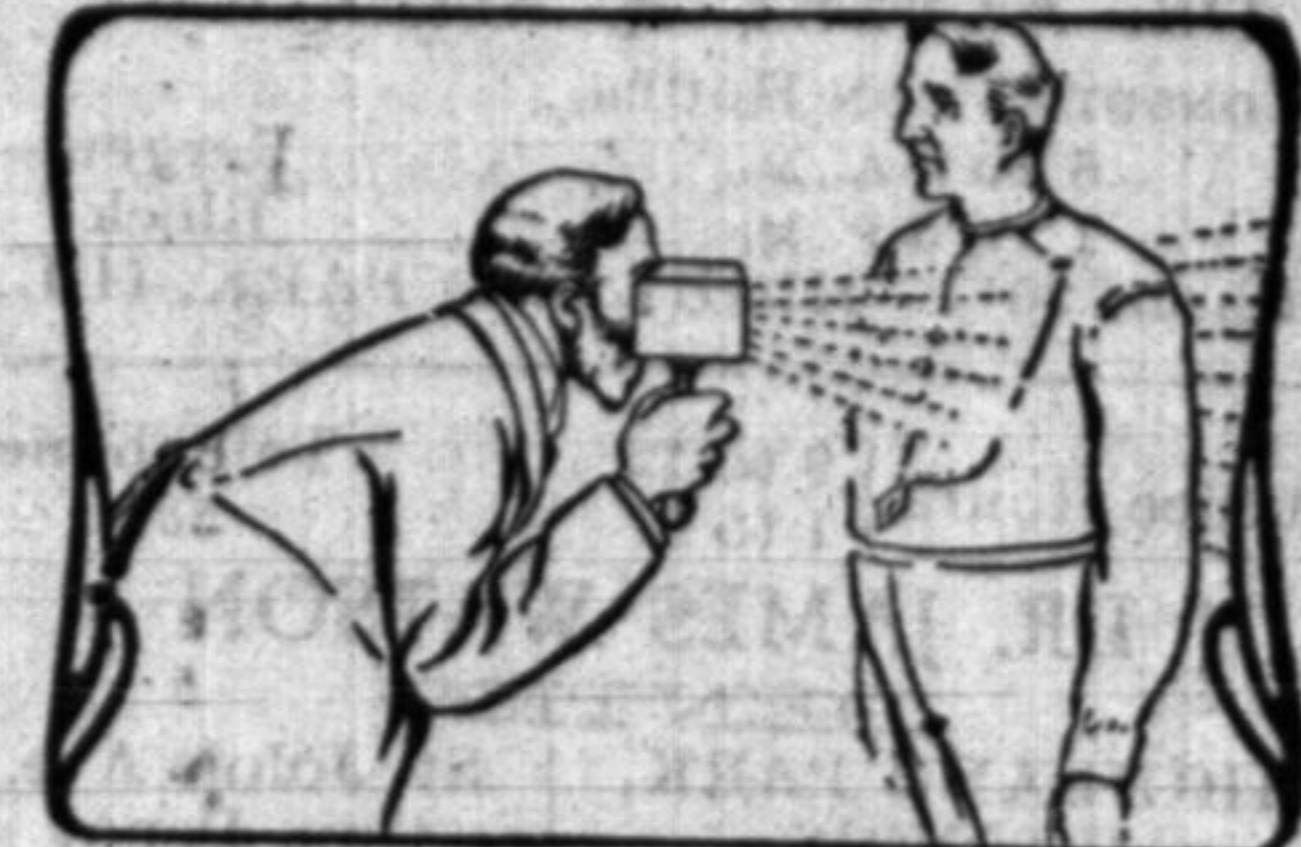
An Ordinance

An ordinance providing for the sale and conveyance of certain real estate belonging to the city of Highland Park, which is no longer necessary, appropriate, or required for the use of said city.

Whereas, The real estate hereinafter described and owned by the City of Highland Park, has been used and occupied as a public library site and has been under the custody and control of the Board of Directors of the Public Library, who have been conducting thereon a public library for the City of Highland Park, the said real estate having been purchased by said city for the use and benefit of the Public Library, and

Whereas, The Board of Directors of said Public Library, by a resolution duly adopted, have declared said site unfit and unsuitable as and for a public library site, and have purchased other property in said city as a public library site, upon which said Board has proceeded to erect a public library building, and the said council of said city is of the opinion that the real estate hereinafter described is no longer necessary, appropriate or required for the use of
