The state of the s or less personally interested or connected with the Gad's Hill Association, but the Moody Sunday School's being situated as it is, some distance from Glencoe, and more than able to take care of its own vast numbers, coupled with its lack of continous orginization for its fresh air encampment, has not tended to bring the camp into the notice of the immediate public.

The Moody fresh air home is an institution supported entirely by the Moody Sunday School, no especial planning or providing of sufficient funds for the summer's outing being made beforehand, their idea being that trust and faith will bring all in due time. The free will offerings of the people have kept up the institution each year.

Mr. and Mrs. Worden, who have charge of the home, with several volunteer "workers" and a cook, are taking care of from fifty-five to sixty different children each week. No child is eligible to this outing who is not a member of the Sunday school and who is not absolutely needy. If a child is sick or ailing he may be kept over the stipulated week, which seems a short enough space of time to the poor little tots. Though sometimes even this glimpse into higher and better things will change the tenor of a child's life.
