Death of Mr. Krumbach

Henry Krumbach, born August 1st, 1847, in Hesse Darmstadt, Germany., died at his residence one and one half miles west of Highland Park, of heart failure, September 2nd, 1905., aged 58 years, 1 month, 1 day.

He came to America 54 years ago with his parents, settling in Chicago. January 11tn, 1874, he was united in marriage with Julie Kenczorra of Chicago, in 1884 removing to Deerfield Township. This union was blest with three sons and two daughters, one daughter, Mrs. Ludwig, and two sons, George and William, together with the mother surviving. Funeral services were held at the late residence on Tuesday morning, Rev. Eugene F. Fuessle of the First United Evangelical Church officiating. Interment at Wunder's Cemetery, Chicago.

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
