Graduating Exercises

The graduating exercises of the eighth grade, class of February, 1906, which were held in the auditorium of the Elm street school last evening, were of unusual excellence. The program of the graduating class was preceded by the mid-year "sing", in which nearly all the classes of the school took part, under the direction of Miss Martindale, the instructor in music. The selections chosen for the occasion were all from the classics, and the manner in which they were rendered reflects much credit upon the children and their instructors.

The essays of the members of the graduating class dealt entirely with the early history of Illinois, with appropriate stereopticon illustrations and the preparation and delivery of the papers was a marked tribute to the training which is bestowed upon the pupil in the public schools of Highland Park.

This is the first time that the graduating exercises of the mid-year class have been held in the middle of the year. Heretofore the exercises of both the mid-year and the regular classes have been held in June, but in future the exercises will undoubtedly be held separately.

Annual Superintendents' Conference

The first annual superintendents conference of the Lake County Sunday School Association was held in the Presbyterian Church at Libertyville Tuesday evening of this week, and was quite well attended by Highland Park Sunday School workers.

The object of the meeting was mainly for an interchange of ideas concerning the work, and the help which one school would get from fellowship with the other schools of the county.
