Ravinia Theatre

Much interest has been evinced, in musical circles, in the coming recital at Ravinia Theatre of Augusta Cottlow. This celebrated planist. whose interesting career has taken her to all the greater cities of both the hemispheres, began her professional career at the age of six, when she played a concert in the town of Shelbyville, Illinois, where. she was born. When she was eight years old she began serious study with Carl Wolfshon in Chicago, and shortly afterwards she gave a recital here.

She was the first child ever invited-to play before the National Music Teachers Association. At the age of twelve she appeared before them at Cleveland, Ohio. When only thirteen years of age she was engaged to play in New York with the late Anton Seide, appearing at the same time with Henri Marteau, the distinguished French violinist. She shortly afterwards made a tour of the Pacific Coast with immense success, which was followed by a trip to Europe. And she was the first concert pianist of thoroughly American training and education to appear there and score a great success. She played with the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra and made a most marked impression. After filling several important engagements she pursued further study under the famous pianist, Busoni, and composition under Otis N. Boic, and for a year she studied ensemble with Carl Halir, the celebrated violinist. Her recent and most successful appearance in ensemble work testified to her splendid ability in this particular line. While in Europe Miss Cottlow's recital tours extended through Germany, Russia, Holland, and England, and she was the first American pianist of renown to play in Russia. Miss Cottlow has played with almost every conductor of importance in this country, including Seidel, Thomas, Gericke, Peaur, Herbert and Walter Damrosch.

Miss Cottlow's appearance at Ravinia Theatre Saturday evening, March 17th, will be her first recital in Chicago or its immediate vicinity for several years. The demand for seats has already begun and it is likely that her many admirers will make the recital a overwhelming success.

Manager Murdock announces completed arrangements with Walter Damrosch and the New York Symphony Orchestra for an extended engagement at Ravinia Park this summer, beginning June 23rd. If generous patronage warrants the management in so great an expenditure, definite overtures will be made to Mr. Damrosch securing the orchestra for Ravinia Park in an annual festival of music. Last season only the latter part of the engagement proved that public taste guaranteed success of prodigious enough force to encourage the management in so unusual a contract.

Notwithstanding the beauty of Ravinia, the splendid concerts given there by Damrosch was meagerly attended at first and only the magnificent response of the music-loving people of the community during the last weeks of the engagement strengthened the management's faith in the

demand for high class and beautiful music. The coming summer's patronage will settle the question as to whether Damrosch and the great Orchestra shall be a permanent June and July entertainment for the fashionable North Shore resort. Naturally, the matter lies wholly with the public.

An Exciting Case

Considerable excitement was caused in this city last Saturday morning by the arrest of H. F. Clow, who works for F. B. Green, on a charge of stealing a sack of Gold Medal flour Friday night. The hearing was held before Judge William Grant in Masonic Hall Monday evening after the close of the Royal Arcanum meeting. Mr. Green prosecuted his own case, and Albert C. Larson appeared for the prisoner. Mr. Lawson demanded a jury trial, and after 20 talesmen had been challenged. six jurors were finally chosen. The testimony of the plaintiff and his witnesses, showed clearly by some-what circumstantial evidence, that the prisoner stole the flour, but by the able cross-examination and argument of the counsel for the prisoner, the evidence was shattered, and it was decided that Mr. Green's chief witness, Mr Prior, stole the flour to use in preparing refreshments for a party of friends. Whereupon court was dismissed, and soon the plaintiff, the prisoner, and the Judge and the jurors were engaged in a friendly game of cards. Justice had not miscarried.

Prohibitionists In The Field

The Lake County Prohibitionists will meet in County Convention in the Temperance Temple, Waukegan, March 5th at 11, a. m. Delegates will be elected to the Senatorial, Congressional and State Conventions, a County ticket nominated and the County organization completed. For the first time the party has elected delegates from every township in the county and the convention will be a delegated convention.

W. A. Brubaker, of Chicago, one of the foremost Prohibition orators of the whole country will deliver an address during the afternoon, and at 8 o'clock in the evening will address a mass meeting. in the Tabernacle, corner County street and Grand avenue.

It is expected that a very strong county ticket will be named. A determined effort is to be made to elect a Prohibition member of the legislature from this district.

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highwood, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered that a special Assessment be made for the construction of a (10) inch sewer in Waukegan avenue from a connection at the intersection of Clay avenue to be laid Northerly to the North line of Washington street and from a connection in Clay avenue and Waukegan avenue Southerly in Waukegan avenue to the city limits of the City of Highwood; in Highwood avenue from the connection in Waukegan avenue West to Jeffrey's Place, with Manholes, House Junctions, Branches and other appurtenances pertaining thereto in the City of Highwood, County of Lake and State of Illinois.

The ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of the said City of High. wood, having applied to the County Court of Lake County for an assessment of the costs of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment thereof having been made and returned to said Court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the twentieth (20th) day of March, A. D. 1906, or as soon thereafter as the business of the Court will permit; said assessment is payable in ten (10) installments with interest at the rate of five (5) per cent on all installments from and after date of first voucher.
